

Their tenacity in the first half was rewarded when **Grace** scored with a superb looping vol-




The match flowed end-to-end, with both sides producing last-ditch tackles and excellent saves to keep things tight.

Fuelling for Performance: Nutrition Workshop with **Year 10 & 11 Sports Academy Students**

Year 10 and Year 11 Sports Academy students took part in an engaging and hands-on nutrition workshop focusing on how to properly fuel their bodies before and after exercise. The session explored the vital role of macronutrients (carbohydrates, proteins, and fats) and micronutrients (vitamins and minerals) in athletic performance, recovery, and overall wellbeing.

Students learned how to tailor their food intake depending on whether they were preparing for an intense training session, recovering post-match, or maintaining their energy levels throughout the day. With guidance, they explored what a balanced pre- and post-workout meal looks like, and how to adjust their food choices depending on their training goals-whether that's building strength, improving endurance, or speeding up recovery.

To put theory into practice, the students then got creative in the food room, designing and making their own performance wraps using a variety of ingredients. Each group considered the balance of macros in their wrap-opting for lean proteins, complex carbs and healthy fats-based on whether they were fuelling up or refuelling after exercise.

The workshop was not only educational but also a fun and interactive way for students to better understand the connection between nutrition and performance. We're proud to see them developing lifelong habits that will support both their sporting ambitions and overall health.





This was Hallie's first time competing at the English Championships and their first competition as a partnership. Impressively, they made it all the way to the finals, where everything came together perfectly and they won gold! A fantastic result for their first outing together.

Just a week later, they competed again at the Invitational competition, held much closer to 7 home at our own club – and once again, they came away with gold.


Congratulations to Roundball House, who collected the most tokens and have earned a non-uniform day on Friday 24th October as their reward!

Finally, there are lots of taster days and open days coming up, so students are encouraged to attend and experience different colleges and courses first-hand.



Attendance Half Term 1 Summary [3-09-2025 - 17-10.2025]

This term we had an overall attendance rate of 89.9% across the school. We are on track to be slightly above the attendance of last year's term 1 attendance of 89.4%.



Our attendance of 89.9% puts us in decile 10- the bottom 0-10% of schools nationally. This means that 90% of schools nationally have better attendance than us and is a worrying statistic. National, the top 50% of schools have attendance above 93.7%. Across Devon we are ranked 38^{th} out of 43 schools.

Half Term 2 target:

We would like our school attendance to be in line with national data and have set a target of 92% for HT2. Help us achieve this by getting your child into school every day.

We have a simple message for all parents. Every day in school makes a difference. We know that attendance helps achievement and that good habits now will help build strong futures later. Help us make HCC successful for your child by supporting their attendance at school on time, every day.

Key reminders:

- We never approve absence for holidays. Learning continuity matters more.
- All absences need to be reported every day via MCAS or the student absence email address, student.absence@honiton.college
- Remember that a half day attendance is better than zero attendance. If your child is unwell in the morning, try and get them in for the afternoon.
- Where possible, arrange medical appointments for after 3pm or in the school holidays. If this
 is not possible, please provide confirmation of the appointment, otherwise the absence may
 not be authorised.
- It is a legal requirement that we have 'eyes on' every child every 3 days so expect a video call request or home visit if your child has missed three days in a row.
