Science and Technology Showcase





On Wednesday 6th July, forty-nine of our Year 8s took a coach trip to Plymouth for a Science and Technology Showcase exhibition. The aim of the day was to find out about opportunities in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics careers, and to experience first hand some of the innovative work being done at Plymouth University.

We had a tour of the campus, STEM talk and then spent the rest of the time looking at exhibits that were presented by current researchers. Some of the highlights were the robotics stands, making autonomous vehicles, programming challenges and even an automatic cocktail maker! Another popular stand was the aerodynamic cycle, which we were surprised at just how roomy it was. Others preferred the forensic lab, plastic retrieval from the oceans and VR headset which allowed us to go anywhere in the world.

Everyone was amazed by the biological research which included organisms that can survive the most extreme environments, weird creatures from the deepest oceans and, last but absolutely no means least, the stick insects.

Robotics Collaborative Project





On Monday 11th July, Some of our top programmers and scientists got together at Colyton Grammar School, along with five other local schools in a "Robotics Collaborative Project". This involved a series of challenges to program VeX robots to complete tasks without any human input.



Highlights of the day included when one of our groups refusing to accept that one of the tasks (releasing objects from the purple tower) couldn't be done, and immediately set about proving that it could. A true example of dogged determination – I was so proud! Another great moment was the robot dancing where one of our groups produced a perfect "mirror" dance with the robot from another school. Overall the group were a credit to HCC, showing the level of programming and engineering talent we have here, along with the resilience to keep going when things don't go as planned.

Tuesday began with an introduction to the English Speaking Union's 'National Public Speaking Competition'. Students learnt about the different roles and skills required. The different roles allow students to practise and excel in different skill sets and the competition's unique format, which pairs the speaker from one school with the chair and questioner of another, encourages quick thinking and relationship building. Most importantly, it's great fun and a terrific way for students to develop their oracy skills in a friendly, supportive environment.

There was a class competition, where many students excelled, but just one winning team made it through to compete in front of the whole of year 10. These students were particularly brave and all scored highly despite having not had much experience of this kind of competition. We recognised all students who performed in front of the year group with the traditional prize at this time of year (a bag of sweets!).

In addition, one student from each class was nominated by the class teacher for their excellent team work and hard work during the class rounds: Poppy Cregan, Brooke Mason, Ciara Tiacoh and Jess Humphries received this further prize. To present these prizes we had the privilege of being joined by Shelby Homes from New College Oxford. We are very grateful that she took time out of her day with our Year 12 students to acknowledge the efforts of Year 10 students. We hope to film a range of speeches so that we can share them to encourage younger students and I have had many students express an interest in entering the regional rounds of the competition next year.



On Wednesday we arranged for students to have a chance to develop their skills and give something back to their community. Over the course of the day, some students helped with a Honiton Learning Community Sports Event, others contributed images to the a new mural for our dining hall, many created films that would support younger students joining HCC and a few students helped to prepare primary students' pots for the kiln. All of these activities are valuable additions to any CV as they demonstrate students' growing confidence and commitment to their community.







On Thursday was our Creative and Digital Future's Day, organised by our Careers Lead. Year 10 students were involved in talks and interactive workshops with visiting employers and universities, learning about the LMI (labour market information) and jobs of the future.
